### Research seminar II: Student seminar (Term 3) and Master thesis

### M2 Economic Analysis

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Number of credits: 3 credits for the research seminar and 26 credits for the master's thesis

Objectives: The goal of the "Student seminar" (T erm 3, from after the April exams to the end of June) is to develop each student's oral skills and ability to present research papers, as well as to develop critical thinking through the attendance and discussion of other students' presentations. Each student makes presentations in front of other students and professors. In the presentations, the student presents **his/her own research outcomes**. I will coordinate with your advisors the dates the seminars take place. All students should attend all presentations and provide feedbacks to their classmates. This is part of the evaluation of your work in this research seminar.

**Details on selected master thesis's research topics and supervision** for each student should be kept up to date <u>here</u>. Please ensure all information is complete.

### **First presentation instructions:**

- You need to prepare a 10 minutes presentation about your research topic, methodology and outcomes. Be aware that you will be interrupted with questions!

- For the seminar to work, you need to do your part of the job. Your responsibilities include: (1) Work hard on your master thesis and take the presentations seriously -put together a well-prepared set of slides, practice in advance, and make sure you have something well-thought out to say, even if what you are presenting is preliminary.

(2) Participate actively, offer constructive feedback nicely. Talk with your classmates. A lot of the learning that happens comes from talking about projects and ideas with your classmates.

(3) Develop advising relationships with THEMA faculty. Importantly, the seminar is intended to complement, not substitute for, the usual advising process. Your advisor will be your main source of research feedback during the process.

The thesis must be sent to your supervisor, each member of your Committee as well as to <u>laurence.jacquet@cyu.fr</u> and the CY and ESSEC administrative managers. The M2EA dissertation defense will take place **between Thursday the 26th of June and Friday the 4th of July**. The precise date depends on the availabilities of your Committee. The thesis defense consists in 10 minutes presentation followed up by

15 minutes discussion. Students will be required to submit and defend an original research thesis. Students should show the aptitude and the skills of the students to do autonomous research
